Athletics Championships

It was very encouraging to see such a good crowd on hand to support our athletes on the main day of our 2017 Athletics Championships. With mild weather, a dry track and the usual excellent preparation from our grounds and housekeeping staff and wonderful support from our P&F and kitchen staff in their catering, the scene was perfect for our second major inter-house competition for the year. From the new competition for 'best mascot' (spoils shared by Tyrrell's cowboy and dairy cows and Croft's Chinese dragon) to the huge participation levels from athletes and strugglers alike, it was a celebration of house and school spirit that said much about the character of our students and the way they embrace the big events in our calendar.

The carnival this year was made all the more special by the presence of two special guests who travelled from Adelaide and Wollongong respectively to present the trophy for the senior boy champion. The Robert Horner Fletcher Challenge Cup was first presented in 1917 by Robert's father and in this 100th anniversary year it was presented by his grandson and great-grandson in a moving recognition of the continuity of our history. Robert Fletcher matriculated from TAS in 1914 as School Captain (Dux), rugby and cricket player, cadet leader, magazine writer and GPS Athletics representative and his is certainly a fitting name to front our senior boys' athletics trophy. At the time of the first presentation of the trophy, Robert Horner, serving with the 33rd battalion on the Western Front, wrote "TAS has the warmest of corners in my heart and I look forward greatly to the first June reunion when war is a thing of the past". Robert did return from the war, became a doctor and practised as an ENT specialist in Lismore until his death in 1935. I was particularly pleased that the 2017 recipient of the trophy, Thomas Goodfellow, was able to show our special guests around the School after the carnival, impressing them that much of what is good about our school has not changed in 100 years.

Year 8 Maths Day

On Friday 16 May a group of Year 8 students were chosen to represent TAS at the Year 8 Maths Competition organised by UNE. There were 60 teams in total from 40 schools around the region including high schools from Armidale, Tamworth, Inverell, Port Macquarie and Coffs Harbour. TAS had 2 teams of four: Alex Gibson, Jack Van Roy, Henry Mitchell and Piyumi Ekanayake; and Jack Hooke, Lachlan Galbraith, Nick O'Neil and Hannah Neilson. Throughout the day students completed various tasks and challenges that put their minds to the test. The first challenge consisted of difficult maths equations that were completed as a team. The second challenge was called the head to head challenge. The premise was that each team went head to head with other teams and competed to figure out rules and patterns of conversion before the others. This was an individual challenge for everyone involved as no one could communicate the rule otherwise the other team would figure it out. The third challenge was the clue challenge, where students had to give their teammates clues as to what the rule was so that they then could combine all the rules and get the answer. The 4th challenge was a "choose your question" section where teams could choose between questions worth 2 points, 3 points or 4 points. In the end TAS Team 2 (Alex, Jack, Henry and Piyumi) brought the trophy home! Thanks to to Ms Robins for accompanying us to the UNE and to Mr Caldwell for making this whole thing possible.

Debaters added to Farrer fixture

The range of sporting fixtures with Farrer Memorial Agricultural High School was broadened this year with the addition of debating to the program of competition for the Dick Hodgson Shield.

A Year 7 team comprising Will Jubb, Hugo Catterall, Frank Perrottet and Ethan Bellman were the Negative team debating the topic 'That the voting age should be lowered to 16 years'. Confident introductory matter from Farrer's first speaker for the Affirmative laid down the challenge, but the TAS team was quick to pick up errors in logic and had the upper hand in the quantity and quality of rebuttals. Despite some shortcomings in their method, TAS was awarded the debate with the Farrer adjudicator complimenting team members on finding a good balance between between conversation and theatrics.

The Opens team of Tom Wright, Nicholas Bohlsen, Owen Chandler and Henry O'Neil argued for the case 'That the Olympics should only be hosted by countries with a good human rights record'. After some deficiency in fully defining the topic – with Farrer successfully countering that all countries have bad human rights records if one goes back far enough - the TAS team built a model for the case, proposing an international tribunal be tasked with judging the human rights records of countries and setting timeline parameters by which they could be assessed. In the end, the debate was given to TAS by a slim margin.

Both schools welcomed the opportunity to debate and thanks are extended to Farrer for hosting us with such warm hospitality.

In other debating news, a Year 9/10 team will this afternoon debate Cooloola Christian College, Gympie Qld, in the second round of the National Virtual Debating Competition, which has been a terrific addition to the debating and public speaking program this

Farrer, Athletics, Maths - Week 3

By 1:40pm last Friday, after a frenetic 'feed and water' station atmosphere in the dining hall at only 1:00pm, students cattlefed into coaches to spend the late afternoon and early evening at Farrer Memorial Agricultural High School in Tamworth. football, rugby, chess, shooting, tennis, basketball and debating teams, (you name it and there's every likelihood there was a team playing or doing it) all boarded coaches and, within minutes, the only things left at School were the Year 12s, a handful of others and eerie silence really. From reports I've heard, all went well in whatever activity was undertaken. This kind of activity is, again, a great recommendation of the School: if you look around for it ('it' translates as just about anything you choose in relation to an activity) you're pretty sure to find it here at TAS

While I know that another report on debating appears herein, I spoke to Mr Tim Hughes after students returned and it's appropriate I think to give an abridged report of his complimentary remarks about Middle School students. On the whole our debaters were impressive with rebuttals and another observation was TAS Middle School team members distinguished themselves in terms of manner voice modulation, eye contact, use of palm cards. In their combination, these points augur well for debating fixtures and commitments later in the year.



We've approaching the half term mark – already. We've only five weeks remaining and there's another, longer break on the horizon. But there's much to be done before we reach it. As well you know, there's a battery of exams. You also know that our Middle School students have their Study Schedules. What you need to know is that these things are little more than unappealing adornments, in the first instance, and, ultimately, millstones unless or until they are opened and used! Boarders are easy to help as boarding and teaching staff are in the habit of referring everyone to their use on a daily basis. Parents of day students need to be aware that the schedules are out and I ask that you speak to your children about them and ask also how 'best' they are being 'managed' over the next week. I stressed again at our Town Meeting Assembly on Monday, the wisdom of seeking clarification of any issue that causes concern.



In this amazingly (on a good day; frighteningly, on a stressful one) competitive world, we can ill afford a situation where boys and girls 'run blind' into an exam room. In a sense, no study renders an exam of little use, not to mention a waste of time. Surely, some of the major functions of an exam result are to indicate to staff and students the effectiveness of a study program as well as (being) a highlighter of areas of 'difficulty'. Simply, we need to know how students are faring academically: students should be given the opportunity to know what they need to do in order to fare better in the future. Success does not exclusively refer to a mark or a grade, either – this is product – only. Process, I believe, is as important and, in some situations, it can be seen to be more important. As well as pinpointing areas of expertise, of weakness, of the effectiveness of a study regime, an exam performance gives everyone a reasonably accurate measure of how someone performs under time conditions. Regardless of our line of work, we adults all have time frames to work within and deadlines to meet. A Middle School exam experience is one that allows students to find out for themselves not only how they are managing their work, but also begins to equip them with the skills necessary to perform as well as they are able to in the future – at times when exam results can expand or limit future tertiary or job prospects.

We need your assistance here. If, in the lead up to the exam week, your children express concern, feel uncomfortable or make comments on issues that we should be aware of, please let us know. Similarly, as implied by my comments about process, this advice applies to the post exam reactions and experience(s).
