FROM THE HEADMASTER

Cadet Leadership

Last weekend saw the first stage of the training for our new cadet leaders as 57 students from Year 9 to Year 12 completed the theory stage of the junior and senior leaders' course. The 13 hours of training on Sunday and full day on Monday highlighted the significant commitment being made by these students, all in the knowledge that their success in the course will mean more work in future as they take responsibility for others rather than enjoying an easier ride. The course aims to put them in situations where they will be out of their depth and help them to recognise how they will react. It tests their responses to adversity and requires that they build a team with people they may not otherwise work with.

It is a process that our Unit Commander, Angus Murray, likes to describe as 'preparing the child for the path, rather than the path for the child'.

The practical component of the course next weekend will focus on navigation and fieldcraft and the group will be tested with long days and physically demanding exercises, all with the purpose of experiencing decision making and teamwork in stressful situations. This level of training is unusual in a school situation but powerful in developing real leadership skills and I wish all our aspiring leaders well for it.

Swimming and War Cries

The end of Week 3 brings together a number of feature events for students and parents alike. The war cry competition that brings our houses in Middle and Senior School together in these early weeks of the year and the swimming carnivals that mark the first inter-house competition right across the School are important markers that the school year is really underway. The mass participation that I know we will see again on Thursday and Friday is a reflection of the spirit of involvement that is central to our school character and it is wonderful to see so much excitement about it.

As always there is sure to be a big parent presence, particularly on the Thursday night, and seating and good vantage points will be at a premium.

School Drive Subsidy

Residents of NSW are eligible to apply for a subsidy if it is necessary to drive your car between home and school (or nearest bus pick up point) for distances over 1.6km. Public and charter travel options for boarders

Boarders are eligible for free travel between home and school on services provided by Transport for NSW School Students Transport Scheme (SSTS).

As well as the daily Xplorer train (Armidale - Sydney Central) and the connecting coach (Armidale - Tenterfield), there are charter services which run at the end of Terms 1, 2 and 3 and beginning of Terms, 2, 3 and 4. These services are extended to the Easter break and the Queen's Birthday weekend when the school is closed and no sporting matches are scheduled.

Coaches depart on the day after 3.30 break-up, so AM Thursday 29 March for Easter - returning on Monday 2 April (in time for supper) and end of Term 1 - depart AM Friday 13 April - returning on Monday 30 April (in time for supper)

FROM THE CHAPLAIN

Absque Deo Nihil #3 2 Peter 3:3-9

In the Sydney Morning Herald a couple of years ago we heard of the horrific news of flight MH370 that seemingly vanished from the planet.

We ask the same question that the author of one article posed "In the age of satellites, surveillance and connectivity, real-life mysteries... intrigue us even more." Maybe it's more than intrigue, maybe it exposes us to how finite and powerless we can be. As the article quotes Hans Weber, a US aviation consultant, saying "We like to think that we are in control...not knowing, means you're not in control."

Sometimes we fall into the trap of thinking 'without me nothing'. Certainly, humanity can convince itself 'without us nothing'. But of course, this is a nonsense, we only have to be thoughtful for a moment to realise there is so much out of our control, so much misunderstanding and even confusion. So where does this leave us?

Perhaps we need to come back to our motto, "without God nothing". This is more tenable, this is more possible, where we do not know, where we know our limitations, we can also know that God knows... without Him nothing.

However, this is where we must ask a serious question. If we stand by this motto, "nothing without God", then we must also ask, we are compelled to ask, and now have license to ask, why do these sorts of tragedies happen in God's world? This is the right question, and can only be posed by someone who has come to the point of knowing they are not in charge, and God is.

You see its not a question that can be asked by the person who says there is no God, there is no logic in asking a myth anything, let alone apportioning blame to a myth. To use Richard Dawkins' words in describing a world without God he says it's a world only characterised by "blind, pitiless, indifference". If that's the case, why do we think things should be different at all, and ask any questions?

So let us ask God, why pain, why suffering? Why don't you put an end to all this mess, and restore your creation to its intended state?

If you listened carefully to the reading you would have heard the beginning of an answer.

In a way its easy to sit back and report on TAS in a judgemental way, not it does not do this or that. But be careful, you are TAS, we are TAS. This place is made up of 'us', not them. How we conduct ourselves contributes to the report card, how have we gone in the past? How will we go this year?

One thing is true, as the passage describes love as patient and kind etc., there is one for whom the report card reads – always. The New Testament book of John describes God as love. God's report card reads 'God is love'. This is good news, when we don't love, when we don't deserve love, God's love persists. This is good news for us here at TAS, our report card reads – 'loved'.

Boarders are always required to sign out of their boarding house and return when required.

Day students are able to access the Dining Hall at breakfast or dinner by swiping their Student Card at the door. Costs associated with meals will be added to their TAS account.

Please note - there will be no tutoring this Thursday Evening due to War Cries and swimming events.

For those of you who are new to TAS, Round Square is an organisation that we have been a member of since 1998 and allows us to forge relationships with over 170 schools around the world and their students. We offer student exchange in Year 8 (in pairs if preferred) to schools within our Australasia and East Asia region for two-three weeks and then again in Year 10 for a period of around eight-ten weeks anywhere in the world. Mr Buntine and I facilitate exchanges and students should speak to either of them to explore the idea further.

A visit from Stephen Foley Head of College and Chief Executive at St Leo's, University of Queensland

We were very fortunate to receive a visit from Stephen last year where he spoke to interested students from our Year 12 cohort, who were thinking of studying north of the border. He spoke on behalf of all the colleges at UQ (single sex and co-ed) and was very informative and passionate about the opportunities that UQ offers young men and ladies to study and further their education.

He will be at TAS on 15 March and will speak with the interested students (and parents) about residential life at UQ, in the Upper Maxwell Room from 1.30-2.00 and then be available for private consultations afterwards.

Year 10 Careers My Future Finder

In Year 10 careers classes we have started the year's program with a discussion of the role and importance of work and employment in the life of the average Australian. The students were shown how to apply for a Tax File Number (TFN) and a Unique Student Identifier (USI) number. These were as tasks to complete in their own time. They are to send me a copy of their USI number for school records. They should not share their TFN with anyone, was the advice given.

Next, we are moving on to the My Future Finder (MFF) program offered by UNE to all students in the region, free of charge. This is an online personality and career matching assessment. A report is then generated explaining their results and suggested career fields they might like to explore and consider. A copy of this report is sent home to parents for their consideration as well. This is an extremely informative report and worthy of family discussions. This report should be coming your way in the next few weeks.

HSC Careers Expo

For the last three years we have been travelling to Sydney for the HSC Career Expo at Moore Park. We have incorporated a visit and tour of University of Sydney and St Andrew's College. There is some possibility of including The Women's College and St John's as well this year.

This will be an overnight excursion leaving after lunch on the Thursday 30 May, travel to Sydney High Boat Shed for our accommodation and return after the Expo and be back at TAS by 9.30 – 10.00 on Friday 1 June.

This has proved to be a very good motivating event for the Year 12 students and I would encourage all students who are thinking of further education to come and see and talk to the numerous universities and colleges who will have displays at the Expo. The Expo also offer HSC tutorials in numerous subjects. More details will follow when the program for the day has been published.



Managing Clashes

Making choices; prioritising. It is a part of life. Even if we could schedule the many activities at TAS so they did not collide, we would be doing students a disservice if we did so. Instead, we help them manage these clashes. There are a few basic guidelines which will help parents support their children through this exercise:

- 1. Communicate Please speak to or email the staff members in-charge of the conflicting activities to alert them to the clash. They will understand and assist in negotiating a solution.
- 2. First Choice sports take priority over other sports.
- Creative Arts take priority on Monday afternoons (although, this does not preclude students from negotiating a compromise)
- 4. Sports take priority on other afternoons (although, this does not preclude students from negotiating a compromise)
- Curriculum (early/late classes, excursions) take priority over cocurricular
- 6. Students should notify their coach if they are to be absent due to any school-based activities

CO-CURRICULAR REPORTS

Trial Bay Triathlon

Sunday's running of the 28th Trial Bay Triathlon witnessed the first 'hit out' for those TAS triathletes chasing their place in the NSW All Schools race later this month.

Set amongst the beautiful South West Rocks coastline, the event comprises a 500m swim in the bay, an undulating 25km ride and a tough 6km run through the bush, finishing with a 2km stretch along the beach.

A blistering swim from James O'Brien saw him out of the water in under 8minutes, with Clancy Roberts, Lucas Cotterell and Sam Jones not far behind. Hamish Tydd and Albertus Hattingh exited the water with the main pack before charging up the beach to the transition zone. Remy Taylor, unable to swim due to a shoulder injury, still completed the ride and run, thus joining the race post swim.

The bike course meandered through the national park, with long straights punctuated by short sharp hills and numerous tight corners. James showed the benefits of a solid training block during the holidays, holding his position within the field and setting a bike split of 46minutes. Sam was close by with Remy and moving through the field during the bike leg. Unfortunately a double flat ended Lucas' day only 10km into the ride.

The run is where the action really happens in a triathlon. Sam surged ahead at this point to finish in a resounding 26th place overall (out of 246 competitors), a sensational performance. James held tough in the run to finish 65th, with Remy in 89th, Clancy 111th (and a much improved run), Hamish in 113th and Albertus despite experiencing painful stomach cramps in the run, still crossed the line 149th.

This weekend a group will head to Port Macquarie for a NSW Triathlon Talent ID camp on Saturday, before the whole triathlon group compete at the Armidale Club race on Sunday.




Twilight Concerts

TAS Junior School believe that happy students are more engaged, motivated and successful at school. We actively seek a balance between the acquisition of essential knowledge and skills, the development of conceptual understanding, the demonstration of positive attitudes and the taking of responsible action. Considerate use of appropriate reward systems recognises and acknowledges students' efforts, contributions and achievements and encourages students to become independent, active and life-long learners.

1. Individual & House Awards

These orally presented awards, are to be given to individuals for specific instances of positive social and academic behaviour or production, as determined by the Junior School teachers. These House Points may be given by classroom and specialist teachers and are not limited to in-class activities. Students will record their House Points in class, to form the weekly House totals which will then be tallied for each assembly for presentation to the winning House. They are also tallied on a cumulative basis for the overall Champion House Cup, presented at Speech Day.

Classroom Awards - Merit Certificates

Merit Certificates are to be awarded by the classroom teacher (or through recommendation by Specialist teachers) to recognise and celebrate individual student achievement within the class and reflect the Essential Elements (Knowledge, Concepts, Skills, Attitudes and Action) of the PYP Program. Merit awards are specifically for classroom effort and achievement, engagement with the conceptual basis of the classroom programme and/or demonstrations of Skills, Attitudes and Actions.

These awards are to be presented in class. There are to be no restrictions as to when and how often Merit Awards are to be handed out, however, teachers will be expected to award each child with at least two awards per term for Transition, Kindergarten, Years 1 and 2, whilst teachers in Years 3, 4 and 5 will be expected to award at least one per term to each class member. A written record of these awards will be kept by the classroom teacher as a record of student achievement. Awards may be presented by the class teacher, a member of executive or an appropriate external presenter (eg guest speaker).

3. Assembly Awards -**School Spirit Awards**

The aims of the School Spirit Awards are to acknowledge and reward outstanding engagement and significant achievement in the School's PYP Programme and/or exemplary demonstration of one or more attributes of the IB Learner Profile.

The award will be named after one of the PYP attributes and include a short citation, using the following as a guide: **Inquirer** - developing natural curiosity; acquiring skills necessary to conduct inquiry and research; showing independence in learning; demonstrating and active love of learning

Knowledgeable - exploring concepts, ideas and issues; acquiring deep knowledge; developing clear understanding across a broad and balanced range of disciplines

Thinker - exercising initiative; applying thinking skills critically and creatively, embracing complex problems; making reasoned, ethical decisions

Communicator – expressing ideas and concepts confidently; using a variety of modes of communication; collaborating with others

Principled – acting with integrity and honesty; displaying a strong sense of fairness, justice and respect; taking responsibility for actions; accepting consequences


Gymnastics
