Student Driving

With more students in senior years striving to achieve their L or P licences, students and parents are reminded that no L or P plater drivers (whether they be students at TAS or another school) are permitted to drive a vehicle into the school grounds at any time, including the beginning and end of term when boarders are departing/arriving at school. This is outlined in the School Rules and Regulations that can be found on the website, in both the Parents and Students Portals.

Other driving regulations are outlined below. Thank you for your support.

A day student may drive to school provided he/she and their parents have provided the 'Permission to Drive to School' form in duplicate, available from Reception or the school website. Students are to park in Douglas St or Mann St only. The vehicle is not to be used between the commencement of the school day and 3.30 pm (unless permission has been sought for Late Arrival/Early Leave in the case of Year 12 students). The vehicle is not to be brought on to school property.

Students are forbidden to drive other students in their cars without the written permission of parents of the passenger, which should then be submitted to the Deputy Headmaster.

Boarders are not to have the use of a motor vehicle in Armidale unless parents have presented a case for good cause and the Deputy Head of House has approved. A separate Boarders Drivers form is available from Reception and the website.

No L or P plater drivers of any age are permitted to drive a vehicle into the school grounds at any time.

TAS STEM TRIP

In this trip to West Coast USA (Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles) students will visit major industry leaders such as Boeing, NASA, and Microsoft and meet with people working on the frontiers of Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics.

There will be plenty of "hands on" experiences at places such as the California Academy of Sciences, Tech Museum of Innovation, La Brea Tar Pits, Intel Museum and opportunities to develop critical thinking, problem solving and teamwork during a simulated space mission at the Chabot Space & Science Centre. The trip also includes a visit to the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and students will do some service learning prior to the trip to look at, and contribute towards, their work of reducing inequity. A visit to the University of California Berkley Campus and a start-up business 'accelerator' should inspire students to aim high in their future careers.

This trip is open to all students in Years 9-12 in 2019. Please see attached for further details about the itinerary.

Costs will be dependent on student numbers and there may be some minor variations to the itinerary but currently the costs are:

These costs include:

- · International return airfares and internal US domestic airfares including all prepaid airlines taxes, surcharges and levies
- 9 nights of accommodation based on students sharing twin rooms & teachers in single rooms. A single supplement will apply in case of uneven student numbers or gender numbers
- Transport by coach as per the itinerary
- Breakfast daily, 9 x dinners
- Sightseeing and entry to attractions as noted in the itinerary.

Additional costs:

- Travel Insurance this can be organised through Horizons Travel but will be done by individuals. The cost can vary depending on level of cover chosen. Some parents may wish to purchase travel insurance from another source. Expected additional cost for mid-international coverage is @ \$180
- Lunches and incidental evening costs students should have @ US\$150 in spending money to cover these costs
- Visa costs (if required)
- Travel to and from Sydney. As this trip starts and finishes during the holidays domestic travel is not included. All costs are EX Sydney.

Bonjour!

One of the best ways to truly enhance visual, auditory and verbal learning is to experience it first-hand. The Study Tour of France is an opportunity for TAS French students from Years 8 to 10 who are continuing their French studies in 2019, to totally immerse themselves into "frenchness". As well as advancing their French language skills, students will experience French culture and every-day life, adding new depths of understanding and meaning to the topics being studied.

By keeping a journal of their trip along the way, students will be putting a magnifying glass on everyday aspects of French language and culture, noting new vocabulary, expressions and cultural and historical aspects learned. Language skills will be extended by challenging their knowledge and courage to use French as much as possible in speaking, reading, listening and writing in French. From the Louvre and Eiffel Tower to the Mont St Michel and Monet's garden at Giverny, students will be absorbing France, it's language and culture by engaging in everyday activities such as buying food and drink, eating at restaurants and cafés, purchasing souvenirs and visiting famous monuments in the City of Light, the Loire Valley and Brittany. They will appreciate the architecture and layout of Paris, interact with French people, experience café culture, get their portrait painted if they wish and explore the historical quartiers of Paris. French students will spend two nights with a French host family, giving them an opportunity to experience family life in France, eating dinner and putting their language skills into action. A challenging and exciting prospect! This immersion experience will improve students' language skills considerably, as well as providing them with greater cultural knowledge of life in a French family. Family and Daily Life are both topics studied in Stages 5 and 6 French.

This type of real-world engagement aims to energise and motivate students' passion for language learning, enhancing enjoyment and appreciation of the language through first-hand, authentic experiences which will have long lasting benefits for all those who participate.

Students' departing gift is one of life

A dozen Year 12 students are marking the end of their schooling with a very special gift – the gift of life.

One in three Australians will need a blood transfusion, and the TAS students believe there was no better time to inspire others and finish a significant stage of life with the bigger picture in mind.

Last year 23 TAS students from Years 10-12 rolled up their sleeves for the cause, however a change to Red Cross Blood Bank rules has meant donors must now be at least 18 years of age. While this has reduced the number of those eligible at school to donate blood, it hasn't lessened the enthusiasm to do so.

While the milkshake and biscuit afterwards are an added incentive, the real significance comes when donors receive a text from the Blood Bank later, informing themof when and how they used your blood – that makes it very real and meaningful.

"One in three people will need blood in their lifetime, chances are they could be your workmate, neighbour or family member. Donating blood takes only one hour and is an easy way to help cancer patients, burns, surgical and trauma patients, people with immune disorders and many others."

The positive attitudes and team spirit, that have been the hallmark of their season, securing them the premiership. We celebrated victories to the 12 Blue and 16 White football teams in their respective grand finals and a narrow defeat to the ever improving TAS 2 Netball team. Whilst I was disappointed not to be in Armidale for these games I was privileged to see some outstanding performances from the 13 dedicated athletes competing at the GPS Athletics Championships in Sydney. I witnessed courageous performances by Joe Kermode (5th place in the U15 400m), Hamish Cannington (4th place in the U17 400m) and Sam Jones (2nd place in the U16 1500m). However, the highlight of the day was Nick Makeham's Open 400m. With only metres to go; the crippling effects of lactic acid taking their toll, Nick called on the reserves that he has forged over years of sporting competition. Shear determination threw him across the line to claim the first TAS victory in a GPS Open event since 2006 – dislocating his shoulder in the process.

All these performances are testament to the hard work and commitment of both athletes and coaches. I extend my sincere thanks to all staff that work tirelessly to provide such amazing experiences for our students. I make particular mention of Jim Pennington who was the Convenor for the GPS Athletics Championships and all those who have supported him throughout the months preparing for this event.

Colour Awards

In Assemblies this week, the School recognises the significant achievements of yr 11 and 12 students in co-curricular activities. This prompts the question "How do students achieve Colours or Honours?"

Students are nominated by coordinators of their activity. Nominations are then discussed in a Sports Council, which comprises four coordinators of activities, the Senior and Deputy Senior Prefects, four captains of co-curricular activities and is chaired by the Director of Co-curricular. The role of the Council is to draw parallels between a diverse range of activities. This stimulates robust discussion at times. However, the final decision is invariably unanimous.

The first criterion for eligibility is *attitude* (to the activity and School). Any candidate for Colours must have brought credit to the School and shown him/herself worthy of representation. The second criterion for eligibility is *accomplishment*.

Colours are recognized at various levels:

- Silver Colours are awarded for School representation in a Firsts team or representation in State competition.
- Gold Colours are awarded for exceptional performances by a member of a Firsts team or representation at National competition.
- An Honours Award may be awarded in singular circumstances for National selection or representation in international competition.

Year 6-10 students are measured against the same criteria and are awarded Silver or Gold Medallions or Honours.

It is appropriate that we recognise significant achievements so that others may aspire to accomplish great things. However, awards should not be the driving force. The strongest motivation comes from within; fulfilling your own goals; conquering your own mountain. What is more, to achieve this with honour; to act with integrity and humility.
